

Miasmatic influence on moral consciousness-A case report exploring the impact of antimiasmatic Medicine on Morality

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Abstract

This study was conducted to encompass the impact of miasm on the morality of individuals of different types. The primary focus was to examine the effect of inherent *i.e.*, hereditary miasm on the developmental psychology of students in the mouldable age group. To represent this, a case report is presented in this article, wherein an individual was treated with individualized homoeopathic medicine as an antimiasmatic intervention.

The discussion given in ‘aphorism no. 5’; in the 6th edition of the ‘Organon of Medicine’ While explaining about the chronic miasm especially about the fundamental one Dr. Hahnemann gave emphasis on the constitution which constitutes morality also. So, study of morality in miasmatic domain is important.⁸ Morality involves the principles of right and wrong that guide behavior within communities. These can differ across cultures and evolve over time, influenced by external factors such as family, religion, and experience.⁴

Dr. Hahnemann, being a genius & visionary in medicine, not only established a method & a precise procedure for investigating



and applying remedies for miasms but he also penetrated deeply into finding of the cause of causes. The source of suffering is positive, demonstrable & perfectly recognizable. That he called it as a miasm.⁴

An understanding of the miasm is our judgement, the ultimate concern of the physician, as it involves maximum understanding of the human, both with respect to the qualities, potentials and defects, failures that hinder him.²

Fundamental miasm-

Fundamental miasm remains dormant for long time environmental stressors can activate the basic miasm & it can be dominant or combine with the already influencing miasm to cause complex miasm.¹.

Moral Values involved in the Study :



Research Design :

Hypothesis-

- ▶ H_1 –Miasm and antimiasmatic treatment influence moral values of the individual.
- ▶ H_0 –Misam and antimiasmatic treatment does not influence moral values of the individual.

Aim & objective of study :

- ▶ To study the influence of the miasms on moral aspect of the individual with antimiasmatic treatment & to bring the state of miasm in latent phase.

Procedure :

Clinical trial (intervention with antimiasmatic)

- ▶ Antimiasmatic medicine will be prescribed to the individual for the study of impact of antimiasmatic medicine on moral values.
- ▶ Meanwhile if individual got any kind of acute disease, then acute medicine will be prescribed as per the symptom similarity.
- ▶ Follow up will be taken 15 days after the prescription of single dose then after the completion of the action of the medicine then the same questionnaire will be provided to the individual

Case Report :

A female student of 21 years had complaint of neck pain for 2 weeks along with great sensitivity of touch and tenderness at neck area. Had a history of meningitis before 3 months. That was treated with allopathic medicines. Patient was having aggravation while reading, writing & at night. Mentally she was dominating, haughty, sensitive and clever.

Constitutionally she was obese, fair and flabby with plethoric look. She was prescribed with Lachesis 200. Relieved her complaints significantly with great relief.

“In accordance with the established methodology, the questionnaire was initially administered to the patient, and the scoring derived from it facilitated a miasmatic analysis. Subsequently, a detailed case history was obtained, upon which the individualized antimiasmatic prescription of *Lachesis 200* was determined. Over the course of 2–3 months and three follow up consultations, the questionnaire was re administered, confirming sustained relief of the presenting complaints and yielding a consistent miasmatic diagnosis across both evaluative approaches. At this juncture, the previously dominant miasm had transitioned into a latent stage, signifying therapeutic progress toward the fundamental miasm. Notably, the patient also demonstrated measurable improvement in moral disposition, as reflected in questionnaire scores and corroborated by clinical follow up.”

The case study demonstrated that miasmatic influence extends to the moral disposition of the patient. The scores obtained both after the initial prescription and during subsequent follow ups provided consistent

evidence, thereby clarifying and substantiating the results of the study.

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
